Through Measure L and Measure J funding the 54-year-old Imperial Valley Campus continues to be tranformed and modernized.

With the completion of the bond-funded 2700 Building, the Career Technical Education Buildings as well as the numerous campus modernization projects many key IVC construction and modernization milestones have been met.

Although there is currently no construction work in progress, Imperial Valley College campus continues to plan for future projects that will commence when bonds can be reissued.

Proposed new construction includes a new Technology/Library Building, College Center, Solar Project and the modernization many of the remaining aging campus buildings and classrooms.







10 YEARS OF TRANSFORMATION ON THE IMPERIAL VALLEY COLLEGE CAMPUS

The demolition of Imperial Valley College's 500 buildings in Fall 2014 was perhaps the most visible aspect in the latest chapter of the ongoing story of transformation at the college.

Removing the buildings marked the completion of this phase that began more than a decade ago and has transformed the campus into one that houses state-of-the-art, "smart" classrooms, labs and services.

The Quonset huts that once sat on the southwest corner of the campus, just west of the 900 Building, were the original "temporary" classrooms where IVC classes were held when the college was located on the Imperial High School campus from 1960 to 1962. They were later moved to the IVC campus and used for various purposes over the next 50 years.

Removing the aged buildings opened up space for future projects. That will occur when future property assessments in the county increase and allow more Measure J-authorized bonds to be sold.

Among future plans is construction of a new Library Learning Resource Center -- a fully equipped technology center - on land where the maintenance warehouse currently is. As we look into the future, additional projects include Automotive and Diesel Training facilities, replete with auto bays, labs, a lecture hall, and more, along with a new student center where the 500 buildings once sat.

The transformation of IVC's now 54-year-old campus began in 2004 when Imperial County voters approved \$58.6 million Measure L, that, in addition to other campus modernization, funded the 2700 building,

a 70,000 square-foot, two-story classroom and laboratory building that opened to students in January 2010. It was the first LEEDcertified science building in Southern California and the first publicly owned LEED-certified building in Imperial County. It also paid for major transportation improvements and conversion of existing classroom spaces into state-of-the-art "smart classrooms."

Voters extended the Measure L bonds when they approved the \$80 million Measure J later in 2010, which included funding for two Career Technical Education buildings and a continuation of modernization of existing classrooms. The new CTE facilities continue to provide a wide range of curriculum for students preparing for careers in public safety, as well as those studying building construction, welding technology and similar career choices. This past year saw bond funds helping provide furnishings, equipment and materials necessary for the CTE buildings.

The transportation enhancements include transit centers that have improved the safety and security of transit riders, in partnership with the U.S. Department of Transportation and the Imperial County


Transportation Commission. Other improvements include two additional entrances to the campus, and a perimeter road.

Imperial Valley College, through Measures L and J, continues to modernize, providing the tools necessary to equip students for this increasingly mobile and technology-driven world in which we live.

MEASURE J and L CONTRACTS AWARDED

Through August 2014, \$69,637,620 in construction contracts have been awarded. One third of the contracts (\$23 million) were directly awarded to local contractors. An additional \$12 million of the work on the Career Technical Facility was performed by local contractors, for a direct infusion of \$35 million into the Imperial Valley economy. The overall economic impact is even greater due to the use of local sub-contractors and the purchase of supplies and services locally for many of the projects.

ABOUT THE BOND MEASURES

Measure J

On November 2, 2010, voters of the Imperial Community College District approved Measure "J", an \$80 million General Obligation Bond measure:

"To improve the quality of education and expand career opportunities, shall the Imperial Community College District be authorized to acquire, construct and improve classrooms and facilities, including vocational, career, and technical facilities, modernize outdated classrooms, and improve student access to computers and modern technology, by issuing \$80,000,000 in bonds at legal interest rates, with an independent Citizens' Oversight Committee, annual financial and performance audits, no money for salaries, and bonds only issued without increasing existing tax rates."

Measure L

At the November 2, 2004 election, the citizens of Imperial County approved Measure L, a \$58.6 million General Obligation Bond measure:

"To prepare students for jobs, four year colleges, and better serve the community by training nurses, law enforcement, and construction trades by building a new science and technology facility, modernizing all buildings, removing asbestos; upgrading security, improving student safety, repairing leaky roofs, plumbing, air conditioning; upgrading wiring for computer technology, shall the Imperial Community College District issue \$58,600,000 in bonds at legal rates, with guaranteed annual audits, a citizens' oversight committee and no money for administrator's salaries."

LOCAL BUSINESS OUTREACH

The Imperial Community College District Board of Trustees recognized that participation from local contractors was a very important aspect of a successful building program for the College by adopting resolution 14678 (Local Business Resolution, May 10, 2010). In an effort to increase local contractor participation, Nielsen Construction, on behalf of IVC, created Subcontractor Community Outreach Workshops to educate and support local subcontractors with an objective of increasing their participation in IVC construction projects. The intention of the outreach events was to enable local Imperial Valley firms to be successful in the bidding process. The workshops included:

- 1. Measure J Bond Construction Program
- 2. Pregualification requirements
- 3. Expert speakers providing information on insurance, bonding, prevailing wage, LEED certification for the projects, Building Information Modeling (BIM) project software for coordination and cost savings.

The college is very happy to report that as result of the outreach workshops the CTE facility was constructed using more than 72% of local contractors.



WHEREAS, the staff of the District shall take additional steps to encourage local participation in

construction and construction-related professional services work. Outreach efforts will be targeted to both existing District vendors and to businesses in the County of Imperial;

commitment to maintaining local business participation in all Imperial Community College District business opportunities.
