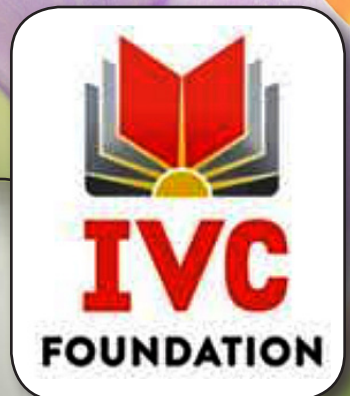
PRESIDENT'S OFFICE

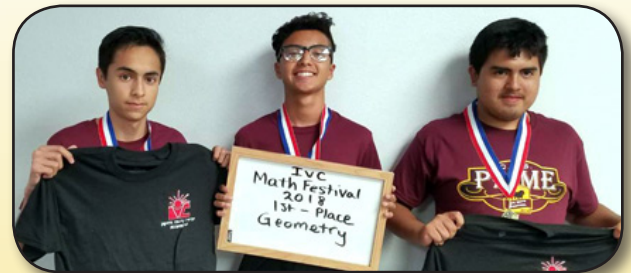
POST Level 1 class conducting vehicle stops on campus. Students are being observed by local law enforcement agencies as potential candidates for employment upon their graduation.

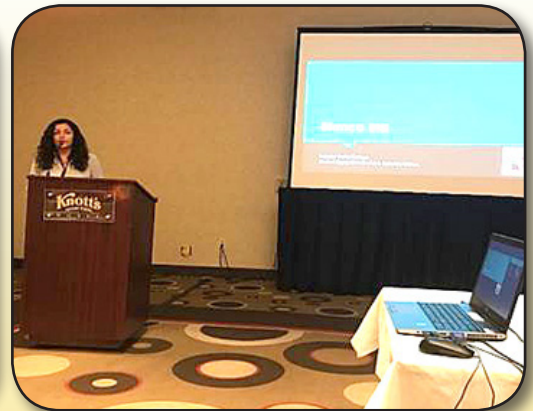


ACADEMIC SERVICES RETREAT

Best Practice Spotlight: Imperial Valley College

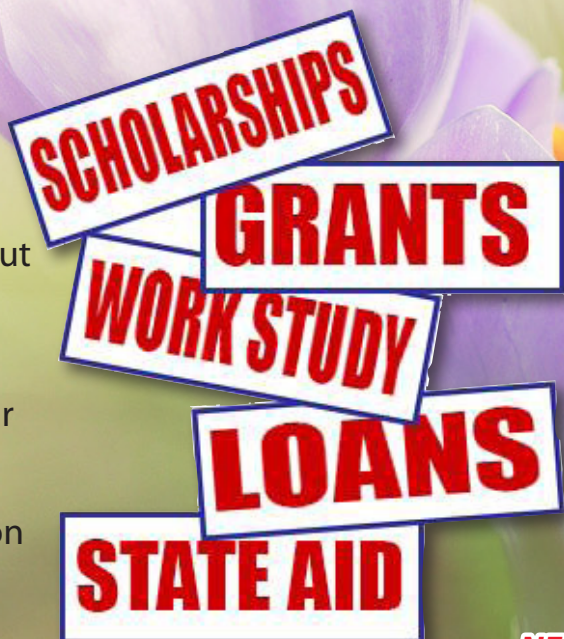
Imperial Valley College has an array of food resources for students. Starting with a food shack in the Extended Opportunity Programs & Services (EOPS) cubicle, Imperial became a weekly distribution site for a food bank and makes daily packs available to any student. Students experiencing homelessness have access to campus showers, shower kits, and financial analysis; faculty and students can contribute to dinner packs for homeless students through the Imperial kitchen. In addition, Imperial provides wireless service and some computer donations.



STUDENT SERVICES

Financial Aid

- Financial Aid staff will be participating in Higher Ed Week II at local high schools next week.
- We have paid out over \$33 million YTD, this is already more than the \$28.8 million that we paid out last year and we still have the summer payment pending.
- It is anticipated the awarding for the 2018-19 year will begin next month.
- We received an additional \$200,000 in Completion Grant funds from the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office. We were able to award 267 students an additional \$750 award.

MAY REVISE: FUNDING FORMULA BASICS

In late January, Chief Executive Officers recommended that an essential component of any new funding formula is building the institutional capacity of the 72 districts. This requires a significant infusion of base funding for California's 114 community colleges.

The Governor's May revise funding formula includes key concepts and recommendations of the CEO funding formula workgroup:

- A two-year hold harmless,
- A significant increase to base funding,
- Calculation of enrollment based on a three-year average,
- Resources for the success of economically disadvantaged students,
- Recognition of transfer to any accredited four-year institution,
- However, the plan does not include a period for extensive research, simulations, or a thoughtful phase-in of the formula metrics.

Base Grants (60% of formula)

- Measures FTES enrollment based on a three-year average.
- Consistently counts summer session enrollments in the fiscal year that follows the summer term.
- Provides a rural allocation consistent with the current formula.

Supplemental Grant (20% of formula) based on number of low income students

Measures three factors:

- Pell grant headcount enrollment.
- Headcount enrollment of students 25 years and older who receive a college promise grant fee waiver (formerly known as the BOG fee waiver).
- AB 540 students per the California Dream grant application.

Student Success Incentive Grant (20% of formula)

Funding for student outcomes with additional funding for outcomes of low-income students:

Progression

- Completion of transfer-level mathematics and transfer-level English within the first year of enrollment.

Outcomes

- Completion of an associate degree or California community colleges baccalaureate degree.
- Transfer to any accredited 4-year institution
- Completion of an ADT
- Credit certificates 18 units or greater
- Completion of 9 career technical education (CTE) units

Wages

- Attainment of a regional living wage after one year of completion.

Provides districts with additional resources based on the number of Pell Grant students meeting any of the above outcomes.
