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ACADEMIC SERVICES

- Nursing & Allied Health Welcome/Back: Thursday, February 15th
 - The Nursing Faculty & Staff welcomed 66 new students starting this Spring '24 semester
 - This included 36 new LVN students, an increase by 12 over previous years
 - The Nursing Faculty & Staff welcomed back 78 RN and 18 MA students
 - In support of the current and future growth of the Nursing program, 12 new part-time nurse faculty were highlighted. Among their roles, part-time faculty will support the continued clinical experiences among various specialties including: LVN, RN Medical Surgical, RN Pediatric, and LVN/ RN Correctional Nursing, in addition to Nursing Learning Center Tutoring.
 - Students learned of IVC Resources available to them including Student Health Center, DSPS, Library Study Skills Tutoring, IVROP, Counseling, Career Service Center, IVC Foundation & Scholarships, and Student Equity.
- 4th Semester RN Employment Mixer: Tuesday, February 27th
 - All 4th Semester RN students (n=42) will participate in a first-ever hiring fair ahead of their June 6th graduation.
 - This collaborative effort is being coordinated between Nursing, the Career Service Center and 'Hire-Ready' clinical partners.

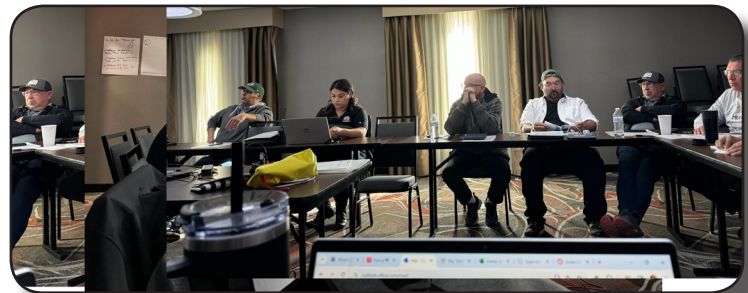
Facilities, Maintenance & Operations Leadership Training with Blanchard

Friday, February 2, 2024,

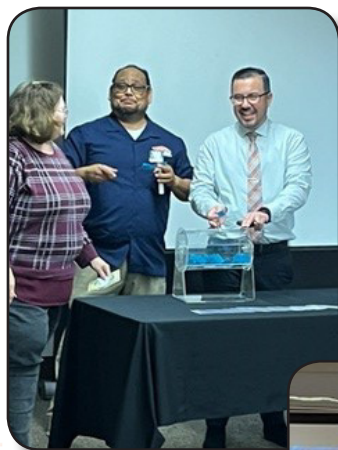
The Facilities/M&O skilled and lead roles took part in

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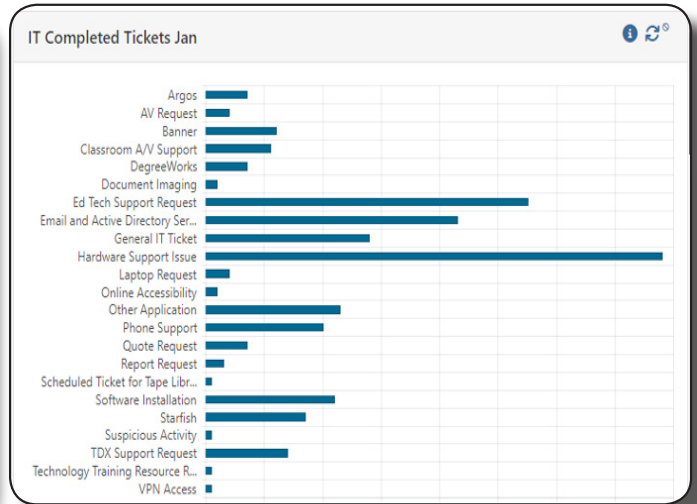
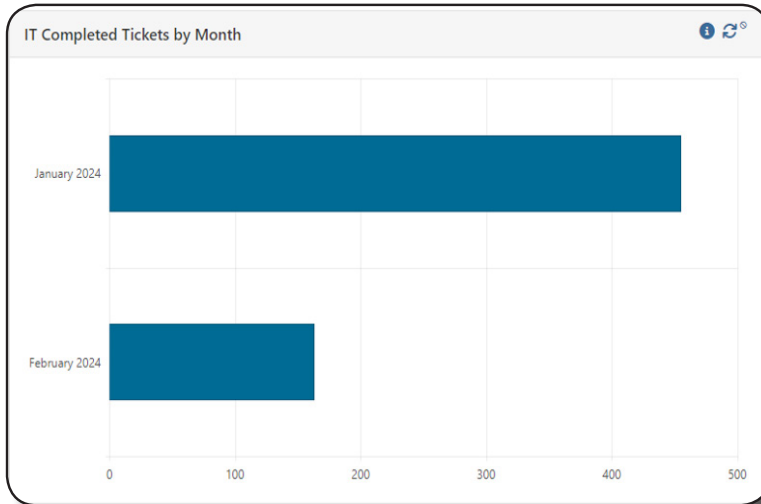

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PRIORITY LEGISLATION

AB 247 (Muratsuchi) Education finance: school facilities: Transitional Kindergarten to Community College Public Education Facilities Bond of 2024

- Authorizes a K-14 school bond on the November 2024 ballot.
- \$14 billion for the construction and modernization of Transitional Kindergarten through community colleges public education facilities.

Location: Senate Appropriations Committee

SB 895 (Roth) Baccalaureate Degree in Nursing Pilot Program

Would establish a Baccalaureate Degree in Nursing Pilot Program that authorizes 15 community college districts to offer a Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) degree. Participating districts must have a nationally accredited Associate Degree in Nursing (ADN) program in an underserved nursing area.

Location: Senate Education Committee

League Position: Co-Sponsor and Support

LEGISLATIVE UPDATES

SB 1183 (Hurtado) Community colleges: registered nursing programs

Would add living in a medically underserved area or population, as designated by the federal Health Resources and Services Administration, to the list of life experiences or special circumstances specified for consideration in a multicriteria screening process.

AB 2532 (Mathis) Community colleges: registered nursing programs

Current law authorizes a community college registered nursing program, if it determines that the number of applicants to the program exceeds its capacity, to admit students to the program using a multicriteria screening process. This bill would add residing within a medically underserved area, as specified, to the list of life experiences or special circumstances specified for consideration in a multicriteria screening process.

AB 2104 (Soria) Community colleges: Baccalaureate Degree in Nursing Pilot Program

Would require the Chancellor of the California Community Colleges to develop a Baccalaureate Degree in Nursing Pilot Program that authorizes select community college districts to offer a Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree. The bill would limit the pilot program to 15 community college districts statewide and would require the Chancellor to identify eligible community college districts based on specified criteria.

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LEGISLATIVE UPDATES (Cont.)

AB 1891 (Weber) Community colleges: allied health programs

The bill would prohibit a community college district from excluding an applicant to an allied health program on the basis that the applicant is not a resident of that district or has not completed prerequisite courses in that district and from implementing policies, procedures, and systems that have the effect of excluding an applicant or student who is not a resident of that district from the district's allied health program.

AB 2370 (Cervantes) Community colleges: faculty: artificial intelligence

This bill would prohibit artificial intelligence from being used to replace community college faculty for purposes of providing academic instruction to, and regular interaction with, students in a course of instruction, and would authorize artificial intelligence to only be used as a peripheral tool to support faculty in carrying out those tasks for uses such as course development, assessment, and tutoring.

AB 2852 (Garcia) Public postsecondary education: California-Mexico Higher Education Development and Academic Exchange Program

This bill would establish, until January 1, 2031, the California-Mexico Higher Education Development and Academic Exchange Program for 400 students who attend a campus of the University of California, the California State University, or the California Community Colleges to attend universities in Mexico and for 400 students who attend a university in Mexico to attend a campus of the University of California, the California State University, or the California Community Colleges each year, as provided.

AB 1914 (Grayson) Community colleges: providers of care for individuals with developmental disabilities: model curriculum

Would require the Chancellor's Office to develop a model curriculum for a certification program for providers of care for individuals with developmental disabilities, designed to be offered at community colleges where there is sufficient student interest and a properly qualified faculty to sustain a certification program.

AB 1575 (Irwin) Public postsecondary education: sexual harassment, sexual violence, and discrimination: disciplinary actions: confidential advocates and advisers

To be eligible to receive state financial aid, an institution of the California Community Colleges (CCC), the California State University (CSU), and the University of California (UC) must adopt a policy permitting a student to be represented by an adviser if the student receives a notification of disciplinary action. The adviser may be a confidential advocate. Each institution shall employ at least two confidential advocates to assist in its response to discrimination. An institution is not required to employ a confidential advocate if it enters into a memorandum of understanding with a local victim advocacy organization to provide confidential advocates on campus. Location: Assembly Appropriations Committee.
